Programs and Coaching

Introduction to CanSkate Rising Star and Junior StarSkate and progression

CanSkate Rising Star: is the bridge between the CanSkate and StarSkate programs. Skaters will work on the last few stages of CanSkate, focusing on skating skills, edges, turns, spins and jumps in a figure skating environment.

What does that mean – a figure skating environment? It means that skaters aren't working on skills solely on circuits and they do not move from station to station.

Junior Starskate: is the Star 1 level of the StarSkate program. This is a full figure skating program that consists of skills (edges, turns, skating skills), field movements such as spirals, jumps, spins, and dance. Transitioning to a minimum of 2 days a week in important for development at this level as skating is a sport that is learned best with repetition of the skills being taught.

Coaching model/approach

Both groups are with the same coach for the entire lesson in a group format, will have use of half the ice:

- Both groups will warm up together at the beginning of the session and will do creative together,
- CanSkate Rising Star will have 40 minutes of group lesson time and 5 minutes of supervised practice time,
- Junior will have 45-minute group lesson time and 15 minutes of supervised practice time,
- Private lessons are not offered at this level

Supervised practice time is where skaters are encouraged to practice skating skills independently. It is important to start them on this at this level because it becomes a large part of the session in the StarSkate program from Star 2 and up.

Skater Expectations

- It is important that skaters are on the ice at the start of the session. Proper warm-up is key to avoid injury and key skills are taught during warm up. It can also be disruptive when skaters come onto the ice after we have started
- Skaters are to wear form fitted clothing, jackets without hoods, hair tied back.
- Please have your skaters use the bathroom before coming onto the ice as leaving the ice during lesson time can cause skaters to miss key instruction,
- Ensure your skater has a water bottle at the boards.

Assessments and Competitions

Assessments: There are three levels in Rising Star:

- There will be assessments every 4 weeks
- Skaters may work on more than one level at a time
- It is important that skaters are present on assessment days. Assessment dates are the following: October 2 and 5, November 2, December 4, 7, 18 and 21

Junior assessment are a little different. When your Junior skater is ready for an assessment the coaching team will explain the process to you. The cost of the junior Star 1 assessment will be a \$15 Skate Canada fee
